## **Cranberry-Maple Oatmeal with Pears**

Prep: 15 minutes Cook: 6 to 7 hours (low)

Non-stick cooking spray

4 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup water

1 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup steel-cut oats

3/4 cup pure maple syrup

1/3 cup golden raisins

1/3 cup dried cranberries

1/3 cup chopped dried pears

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon or 5-spice powder

1 teaspoon vanilla

1/2 teaspoon salt

Milk (optional)

- 1. Lightly coat the inside of a 31/2- or 4-quart slow cooker with cooking spray. In the prepared slow cooker combine the water, oats, maple syrup, raisins, cranberries, pears, cinnamon, vanilla, and salt.
- 2. Cover and cook on low-setting for 6 to 7 hours. If desired, serve with milk.

# Cleveland Hosts the 2024 Pan-American Masters Games



Cleveland hosted the 2024 Pan-American Masters Games (PAMG) July 12-21, 2024. This multisport competition welcomed thousands of athletes from around the world in a celebration of health, vitality, friendship and active lifestyle.

Participants competed in 24 medal contending sports, one of which was swimming held from July 17 to July 20 at Cleveland State University. Among the 287 swimmers entered were approximately 35 O\*H\*I\*O Masters swimmers and of those, 15 earned gold medal honors!

It was fun to see swimmers from all over the world come to Cleveland to swim in one of "our" pools. Some were seasoned swimmers; others entered


A Bundle of Butterfliers: Judi, Elise, Ashley and Kati

their first meet ever. Some traded swim caps with our global competitors.

One of the coolest events for O\*H\*I\*O Masters was the second heat of the women's 100 butterfly where O\*H\*I\*O Masters swimmers Kati Pederson, Ashley Braniecki, and Elise Pichola finished 1-2-3 in the heat, but because they were in different age groups, they were 1-1-1 on the podium! Judi Norton, who swam in the heat previous, finished second in her age group (lower left).



As a recognized meet, swimmers were able to enter relay teams with anyone at the meet. Maureen Andree, Angela Sedivy, Jennifer Savage, and Kristi Tabaj joined together to swim for Team MAJK (above) did just that, and when the waves had settled, they came away with a silver medal.



Two of our senior swimmers, Luise Easton and Susan Paris, (below) represented Ohio Masters well by collecting nine medals between them, and with Pam Beck and Judi Norton, added two more silver as official O\*H\*I\*O relays.



Several members also volunteered hours of time in 4 hour shifts over two weeks. They are the real stars as this event could not have been possible without volunteers. THANK YOU to all of the unsung heroes of the meet and other events for all your efforts to make PAMG an event to remember!

The 2024 Pan-American Masters Games began with a welcome celebration in Public Square where a rousing crowd of family and spectators greeted us.

I was a little emotional as it occurred to me that people from all over the world were gathering for a common purpose—and right here in my hometown. Like me, my fellow athletes cared about family, friends, living in peace, and excelling in a sport. I couldn't help thinking, "I wish



we could all get along." I met people from Mongolia, South Africa, Poland, India, Russia, Mexico, Canada, and all over the USA.

My goal was to win at least one medal. I swam in the 800- 400-, 200- and 100-meter freestyle and the



50-meter butterfly events. I also swam on a USA 200-meter relay team.

I was happy with how I swam. I won a bronze medal in the 800-meter and 400-meter freestyle and the 50-meter

butterfly. I won a silver medal in the 200-meter freestyle and the relay. I was especially happy with the silver medal in the 200-meter freestyle as I swam at top speed for the entire distance, one second behind the gold medal winner.

There were events around town to show off the city. I attended a Guardians game where an entire section of the stands was set aside for Pan American athletes. There was also a sold out night at the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame.

I am grateful that I was able to participate in the Pan



American Games. I will treasure the lifelong memories of camaraderie with my fellow athletes, the thrill of doing well in the events, and the positive impression Cleveland made on the world.

## LELMSC Success at Spring Nationals!

Held simultaneously with the 2024 U.S. Olympic Team Trials at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis, USMS hosted its 2024 Spring Nationals down the street at the IU Natatorium, June 20-24, 2024. Forty events were held over five competition days, with 2,320 swimmers across the country entered. Locally, we had three swimmers from NCLE, 40 from O\*H\*I\*O Masters, and two registered as unattached, participate in the event.



The Lake Erie LMSC produced a number of All-Americans. Arlene Polen, 90, won the women's 90-94 50 free, dropping over 35 seconds from her time earlier this year at the Lakewood meet.

This was only Arlene's second swim meet—way to go, Arlene! Bill Learmonth, 89, was victorious in the men's 85-89 200 breaststroke, exceeding the second-place time by over three minutes. Luise Easton, 85, won the 500 free and the 200 free, and

was first runner up in the 50 breast and 50 back, in the women's 85-89 age group. Tom Spence, who recently aged up to the 80-84 age group, won the mile in his age group, dropping over three and a half minutes from his seed time. The other half of this distance duo, Diane



Spence, claimed first place in the women's 70-74 age group, and also earned second place finishes in the 500 free, 200 free, and 200 breast. Kristen Troyer, 31, took just under 30 seconds off her mile

time to win the women's 30-34 age group, yielding a very impressive time of 18:33.18.

With our large turnout, O\*H\*I\*O Masters was able give every swimmer who wanted to swim on a relay a chance to do so. This was no easy feat, especially when an out of pool injury jeopardized this goal. Thank you to all swimmers for being flexible! While competition was fierce, several relays placed Top 10 in their age group:

Men's 25+ 200 Medley Relay, 10th: John Scalli, AJ Quinn, Justin Hill, and Nazar Tanovskiy

Men's 75+ 200 Medley Relay, 4th: Sid Hall, Bill Learmonth, Bob Williams, Tom Spence



Women's 35+ 200 Free Relay, 7th: Ashley Braniecki, Kristen Bergmann, Amy Hodgekins, Kati Pederson

Women's 55+ 200 Free Relay, 8th: Luise Easton, Colleen Feldkircher, Ann Marshfield, Diane Spence

While fast swims and big wins should be recognized and celebrated, long meets result in LOTS of deck time, yielding great conversations, lots of laughs, and new friendships. I personally enjoyed getting to know swimmers outside of my normal lane. A special shout out to Hilary Byrne and Lisa Porter who brightened my spirits throughout the meet.

After hours at the competition pool, many Lake Erie LMSC swimmers took advantage of the proximity

of 2024 U.S. Olympic Team Trials and Aqua Zone, and cheered on team USA hopefuls at night. Surrounded by ~20,000 fellow swim fans, this was truly an electrifying and emotional experience. If you were lucky enough, you may have witnessed Gretchen Walsh breaking the 100 butterfly world record in the semi finals or Regan Smith breaking the world record in the 100 backstroke at finals.

## **Congratulations, Sid Hall!**

## 2024 O\*H\*I\*O Masters Lifetime Achievement Award

Sid Hall has been a lifelong swimmer from his high school days to his most recent swims for USMS. He has excelled in every level of completion over his 74 years of competition, except for his "37 year taper" between high school and Masters swimming stints. He once quipped, "There's three things that keep me going. I want to keep my body

going as best I can, I want to keep inspiring and improving, and I want to compete." And as you will read below, he does!

Sid was a multi-sport athlete at Grandview Heights High School in Columbus where he was a three-time swimming state meet qualifier and twotime state champion winning the 100 free as a junior and the 50 free as a senior. His times

ranked him as a two-time high school All-American (top 20 in the USA) before graduating in 1953.

Sid's Masters career started when he saw an article in the newspaper about senior games and thought that might be something he could do. Unfortunately, he had to wait 4 years to compete as he was only 51 at the time. He kept the article as motivation, and entered the National Senior Games when he turned 55, and has been swimming ever since, competing in all of the NSGA swimming championships since 1993 except for the 1995. Last summer, at age 87, he won 4 medals in Pittsburgh NSGA meet, including gold

in the 500 free (and ranked him third in USMS top 10 as well.) At the Minneapolis NSGA he won gold in all 5 of his events. In national senior games competitions, Sid has won so many medals and set several NSGA records, that in recognition of these achievements, the Ohio Senior Olympics inducted Sid as a member of the Ohio Senior Olympics Hall

of Fame in 2012.

Sid also competes in Masters YMCA National meets where he often medals, many of them gold. In 2018 Hall took first in the 500 yard freestyle (8:25.78), second in the 200 and 100 free and third in the 50 free. That same year, he swam USMS Nationals at Indy he was first in the 200 free and third in the 500, 100 and

50 free. These accomplishments occurred just one year after two major surgeries (shoulder surgery and then very delicate spinal decompression surgery.)

In USMS competitions spanning 33 years, he has amassed 175 Top 10 individual and 63 relay swims, including one All American (#1 individual ranking) and 18 All- American relay rankings. Three of those relays were USMS National Records. Most recently, three of his relay teams were ranked in the top 10 World Swimming (previously FINA) tabulations. Sid has placed in the top 10 every year but one since 1991.



### Isle swimmers had outsized presence at 1952 Olympics



The Summer Olympics in Paris get under in four weeks. It's something I always look for-ward to. Today, however, I thought I'd look back 72 years at the 1952 Helsinki Games, when three swim-mers from McKinley High School helped put the United States at the top of the medal count.

Yes, you heard me right. McKinley High School. Jamaica does produce some great sprinters. Kenya is known for the best long-dis-tance runners. But these are countries. McKinley is a high school, not even a square mile in size. How could its swimmers have that much impact? Let's see.

#### Meet the swimmers

The three were Ford Konno and Evelyn Kawamoto, both of whom had just graduated from McKin ley in 1951, and Bill Woolsey, a junior. Joining them in Helsinki from Hilo High School Konno's father was an

auto mechanic, and he named his son for the Model T Fords he repaired.

Konno won two gold med-als (in the 1,500-meter freestyle and 4x200 freestyle relay) and one silver (400 freestyle). Kawamoto won two bronze medals (400 free-style and 4x100 relay). Woolsey also took home a gold medal in the 4x200 re-

lay, and Oyakawa won gold in the 100 backstroke.

One lap in Olympic-sized pools is 100 meters.

#### McKinley came in 16th

"If it had sovereign coun-try status, Honolulu's McKinley High School would have tied Denmark in 16th place for medals in the 1952 Olympic Games," Ferd Borsch wrote in The Hono-

lulu Advertiser in 1992. McKinley athletes garnered more medals than Canada, Poland, Netherlands, Turkey, Romania, Nor-way, Argentina, Brazil, India and New Zealand.

That's astounding in and of itself. But even more amazing, I think, is that the six medals won by these McKinley students moved the United States from second place behind the Soviet Union into first place in the

total medal count. The USSR had maintained a lead in the overall medal count for 12 of the 14 days of competition in Helsinki The U.S. trailed with just two days to go. And then the

### Men's 100-meter

backstroke Yoshinobu Oyakawa gradated from Hilo High School and was a freshman at Ohio State. In the NCAA championships in April, he came in third in the 100 backstroke. His Ohio State teammate lack Taylor took first.

Coaches thought the 8-year-old had not reached is peak, and they were right. Three months later, in Helsinki, Oyakawa surprised veryone in the semifinals when he came in first. He shattered the world record. set at the 1936 Berlin Games, with a time of 1:05.7.

The next day, Aug. 1, he repeated his first-place vicory in the finals. It was othing less than sensaional. He broke his own world record with an im-pressive time of 1:05.4. Tayor took the bronze medal.

#### Women's 4x100 relay

The U.S. team, composed of Jackie LaVine, Marilee Stepan, Jody Alderson and Hawaii's Evelyn Kawamoto, set a new world record in the qualifying heats of the women's 4x100 relay,

In the finals, Hungary won and Holland came in second. The U.S. came home with bronze medals, and that cut he Soviet lead. Kawamoto also brought home a bronze nedal in the 400 freestyle.

Shiro Hashizume of Japan had set a new Olympic record of 18:34 in the quali-fying heats. Konno's time

was unremarkable — 18:53. In the final, Hashizume took a small lead at the outset of the race. The Japanese "flying fish" continued to lead at the 1,000-meter mark.

A hundred meters later Konno began asserting himself. He pulled even with Hashizume at the 1,200-meter mark. Then Konno displayed why he was a champion. He was at his best when the

With 50 meters to go, he caught and passed Hashizume and held a 2-meter lead at the last turn. Konno then pulled away from Hashizume, beating him by 11.4 seconds — about 20 meters. His time set a new world record of 18:30. His gold medal put the U.S, ahead of the USSR for the first time at the 1952 Olympics.

Konno noted proudly that three full-blooded Japanese men placed 1-2-3 in the 1,500 tyle. He had won. Hashizume from Japan was second, and Tetsuo Oka-moto of Brazil was third.

freestyle relay
On the final day of the
Olympics, Woolsey and

Konno teamed up with Wayne Moore and Jimmy McLane to swim in the men's 4x200 freestyle relay.

Woolsey swam second for the U.S. team. When he hit the water, the favored Japanese team was leading by 10 yards, the Advertiser's Andrew Mitsukado wrote. Wool-sey swam the race of his life

and cut the lead to 5 yards. Konno then took over. "Up to his start, the U.S. team as a body length and a half back of the great team from Japan," swim coach Soichi Sakamoto said. "Konno's outstanding sprint and deter-mined fight made it possible for our 800-meter relay team to turn a deficit into victory

"Konno showed that he was the greatest swimmer, as he turned the margin of defeat for our team to one of victory."
In the 400 freestyle,

Konno broke the world record but was edged out by Jean Boiteux of France, who was even faster. Konno won a silver medal to add to the two gold medals he won in the 1,500 and 4x200 relay.

In all, the Hawaii swim mers set five world records at the Helsinki Gam

Sports Center After the closing ceremonies, the Advertiser wrote that the "perfor-mances of this year's crop of swimmers merely added to a long history of recordhreaking Olympic swimming achievements that stretched from the days of Duke Kaha-namoku, though Warren

"Conditions locally are near-perfect for the early development of athletes in almost every field but that of winter sports. With top flight coaching, this raw ma terial has gone on to win world recognition. This re-cord gives Hawaii a strong claim to the title of Sports Center of the World."

#### Epilogue

Konno and Woolsey participated in the 1956 Olym pics in Melbourne, win the silver medal in the 4x200 meter freestyle relay. Oyakawa came in eighth in the 1956 Olympics in the 100

Konno and Kawamoto married in 1956 and had two daughters. All four swimmers became teachers and swim coaches. Woolsey's grandson Ikaika Woolsey was a quarterback for the

2012-16.

Just to be a part of the Olympic Games was very exciting," Konno recalled. There were so many coun tries, and I was just a little guy from the territory of Havali representing the United States. And then winning two events, that was the pinnacle, the ultimate

#### Final tally

How did McKinley's six medals influence the total

medal count? On Aug. 3 the final tally was 76 medals for the United States and 71 for the Soviet Union. The U.S. would not have topped the Soviet Union and come in first place without the McKinley students. And Oyakawa's gold medal was icing on the

Can you think of another situation where one high school anywhere in the world was able to make this big a difference? I can't.

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
