Define volunteer roles

- Why don't people step up?
 - Unknown size and length of commitment
 - Time constraints
 - "Someone else will do it"
 - Fear of overcommitting



Define volunteer roles


- Define specific roles
 - It's easier to recruit for multiple smaller, more specific roles than it is for general, open-ended roles
 - What do you end up with when you define multiple specific roles?
 An organizational chart!

Recruit and retain volunteers

- If a position is open, leave it open don't let existing volunteers take on open positions!
 - It's easier to recruit for positions that are open!
 - You don't want to burn out your existing volunteers
- Match the volunteers' skills and temperament (and availability!) to the role
- Make a specific request
 - Reach out to an individual asking them in they are interested in filling one specific role. Even if they are not available or interested in that role, it can start a conversation with that person about what they can do and what they want to do
- Give volunteers room to do their job
 - Life gets in the way sometimes that's OK!
 - Don't micromanage or re-do their work



Volunteer events

- Host in-person events for your LMSC volunteers to build camaraderie with each other
 - In-person board meetings
 - Social events
 - Service events (Food Bank session, Habitat for Humanity build day, ALTS lessons)
- Encourage participation in USMS national events
 - National meets / national open water events
 - Annual Meeting
 - Relay
- Create opportunities to recognize and celebrate your volunteers
 - Annual Meeting / Awards Banquet
 - LMSC Hall of Fame
